

The largest forum on urban sustainability in Europe!

The European Conference on Sustainable Cities & Towns is the biggest conference series on urban sustainable development in Europe. Hosted by the City of Geneva from 17-19 April 2013, the 7th European Conference on Sustainable Cities & Towns offered a place to discuss how cities can drive a transition towards sustainability in the face of the current economic, environmental and social crises. As global policy processes have largely failed to put the world on the track to sustainability, hopes are increasingly placed on local and regional actors. However, as cities across Europe struggle with austerity measures, can they meet the challenge to drive such a transition?

Good practice examples from local and national governments, and reflections from sustainability experts, finance and business representatives, made this an event not to be missed.

Key messages

- **Times of scarcity are times to turn towards sustainability:** Cities are best placed to create a green and socially responsible economy as an effective response to today's crises, and to promote positive activities that value human relations and ecologically sound processes.
- **Urban areas consume resources, but can also produce them:** Cities and regions should explore their own strengths and potential before looking beyond their area.
- **Bridge the culture and communication gap:** Build partnerships between the public and private sector to find new ways to best leverage resources and generate smart, sustainable and inclusive growth.
- **Ensure social cohesion:** Cities need to ensure that quality of life is shared in a more equitable way, in order to create a spirit of solidarity and safeguard the stability of urban societies.
- **Strengthen the local and regional focus in the spirit of European and global responsibility:** Strategic alliances, self-confident representation, commitment and openness for dialogue are crucial to achieve a closer link and the deeper involvement of local governments in relevant international processes.

About the host city

For many years, the City of Geneva has been committed to promoting sustainable development at all levels. Since 1980, it has been at the heart of international thinking on this issue, hosting the Brundtland Commission, which shaped the report "Our common future" published in 1987. Since then, the City of Geneva has firmly chosen the path of sustainability.

Measurable sustainability objectives were defined for the 2011-2014 period in the following areas: shared vision and participation, clean air, renewable energy, biodiversity, responsible procurement, urban planning, mobility, integration, neighbourhood well-being, local agriculture, work-life balance, access to culture and cooperation.

Exploring the crucial role of cities and towns

**How can cities contribute to maintaining and regenerating their resources?
Can cities become producers rather than only consumers of resources?
How can city regions become more independent from the global economy?**

“Cities have a key role to play in this transformation towards sustainability. They have a number of instruments in their hands, such as green public procurement, waste and water management, improved mobility, housing improvements, stimulating eco-product markets, and urban planning. We are also starting to talk about urban mining. Urban mining may sound like an urban legend, but for making one golden wedding ring you would need approximately 10 tons of golden ore but only 10 kilos of mobile phones.”




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
